Grant will allow start of YouthBuild program

Little Dixie Community Action Agency has been awarded a grant of \$643,859 to start a YouthBuild program in southeast Oklahoma.

The funds, from the U.S. Department of Labor, will allow Little Dixie to recruit 30 young adults ages 18-24 who will work toward their GED while learning job skills and serving their community by building affordable housing. The YouthBuild program will work in conjunction with Little Dixie's Self Help Housing Program to teach construction skills to the participating youth. YouthBuild is aimed toward high-risk young adults, such as high school dropouts, who need life skills training to overcome past mistakes in order to become productive citizens.

"Young people are the future of our community, and we want to provide them with every opportunity to succeed," said Randall Erwin, Executive Director of Little Dixie. "We're proud that Little Dixie was able to secure this YouthBuild grant for our community in order to help our local youth reach their goals."

The U.S. Department of Labor has awarded \$47 million to 96 YouthBuild programs around the country to provide low-income youth who have dropped out of high school with vital opportunities to become productive adults.

In 226 urban and rural communities, YouthBuild has engaged 8,000 youth each year, 72 percent of them young men, and 91 percent high school dropouts. Sixty percent complete the program, and nearly 80 percent of graduates go on to college or jobs earning more than \$8.50 an hour.

YouthBuild is a youth and community development program that simultaneously addresses core issues facing low-income communities: housing, education, employment, crime prevention and leadership development. In YouthBuild programs, low-income young people ages 16-24 work toward their GED or high school diploma while learning job skills by building affordable housing. Self-Help Housing delivers the biggest gift under the tree

VALLIANT – Ronald Anderson received a very large gift in a tiny package this past Christmas season. On Dec. 17, he was presented the keys to his new home by officials from Little Dixie Self-Help Housing.

The three-bedroom, two bath brick home – which includes a garage, wrap-around porch and stunning midnight blue countertops – was built on land which has been in Anderson’s family for generations. The location four miles south of Valliant was home to Anderson’s grandparents, the Bains.

Little Dixie CAA Executive Director Randall Erwin, USDA Rural Development Area Specialist Zack Williams and State Rep. Jerry Ellis presented the keys to Anderson a week before Christmas. Erwin said he was happy to see Anderson, a Valliant school bus driver, take occupancy of the new home.

Ellis said “I’m proud for anyone who gets a new home.”

“It adds so much to their life,” Ellis said. “They nail down roots in the community.”

Valliant Church of God Pastor Rick Patterson was credited with providing much of the painting services on the home. Anderson and his family did a significant portion of the labor, which is part of the Self-Help program that builds instant sweat equity into the home purchase.

Little Dixie Self-Help Housing has built nearly 2,000 homes over three decades in McCurtain and surrounding counties.
